



New Year's Resolution: Volunteer!

One of the first events of the New Year is the Dr. Martin Luther King Day of Service on Monday, January 18th, with a challenge from the NM Commission on Community

<u>Volunteerism</u> (NMCCV) to make this a "day on, not a day off." Curtis Cannon, Executive Director of the Commission and SHARE Advisory Committee member, explains.

"MLK Day of Service is the only federal holiday observed as a national day of service, honoring Dr. King's life and legacy, which is his commitment to service and social justice to make the world a better place for us all." Curtis began his own career in community service with a MLK Day service project in high school. "One quote from Dr. King that has guided my work at the Commission is 'Life's most persistent and urgent question is what are you doing for others?"

There are many ways New Mexicans can celebrate MLK Day in New Mexico, where community projects range from building school playgrounds, to feeding the hungry, making sure families are safe in their homes, hosting community dialogues and much more.

How to Improve Literacy in New Mexico

Did you know that 46% of New Mexico's population is functionally illiterate? About 900,000 adults are in need

of literacy services, according to the <u>New Mexico</u> <u>Coalition for Literacy</u>. Throughout the state, organizations are working to improve literacy.

One organization is the <u>Imagination Library of Grant County</u>. Affiliated with <u>Dolly Parton's Imagination Library</u>, the Imagination Library of Grant County mails books in bulk directly to the homes of children, and recently mailed out its 65,000th book to children in Grant County, volunteer Loren Nelson said.

A three-year longitudinal study comparing test scores of children in Cobre and Silver school districts showed that the Imagination Library improved literacy among students.

"So far, 75-80% of children who receive books [from the Imagination Library] were at or above grade level for reading, and 45-50% of those who did not receive books were at or above grade level," Nelson said.

Who Are You Going to Call?

If you need help in a hurry, who can you call for information? A group in Albuquerque's South Valley is working with their State Senator, Michael Padilla, to identify and

coordinate the multiplicity of phone call-in programs that offer services to families with young children.

Working with the <u>South Valley Early Childhood Group</u> (SVECG), Senator Padilla sponsored <u>Senate Memorial</u> <u>106</u>, which was unanimously approved in the 2015 legislative session. The Memorial calls for a "study of the feasibility of implementing a coordinated helpline pilot program in Bernalillo County to provide information about health and human services to assist families with young children and prenatal needs."

Last Fall, the SVECG Community Family Hub Action Team took the lead in hosting a gathering of a dozen of the two dozen call-in lines the group has identified. The gathering resulted in many of the programs meeting for the first time and exchanging information about their respective services.

Next steps call for more networking meetings and information sharing, resulting in a report and recommendations to be presented to the Bernalillo County Commissioners and the NM Health and Human Services Committee.
